

What to know about high KDPI kidneys



What is a high KDPI kidney?

KDPI stands for Kidney Donor Profile Index. This index gives deceased donor kidneys a score for how well they are expected to work.

A high KDPI kidney is a donor kidney from someone who has died that is expected to work for a shorter time (on average 7-10 years) due to the donor's age, height, weight, or health history.

There are also medium and low KDPI kidneys, which are expected to work for longer (on average 10-15 years).

Why might someone choose a high KDPI kidney?

For many people, high KDPI kidneys work very well for a long time.

People who are open to a high KDPI kidney may have a shorter time on the waitlist and on dialysis. The shorter your time on the waitlist or dialysis, the better for your health. In fact, being on dialysis for 5 or more years can be hard on your body, raising your chance of serious health problems or even death.

Saying you are open to a high KDPI kidney does not mean it is the only type of kidney you can get – it just may give you more options and a kidney sooner.



Your transplant doctors will ask if you are open to a high KDPI kidney during your evaluation and yearly follow-up appointments. But you can talk to them about your decision to accept a high KDPI kidney at any time.

Some people first decide to not accept a high KDPI kidney, then after spending a while on the waitlist and dialysis, they end up accepting a high KDPI kidney after all. **If you are open to a high KDPI kidney – let your transplant doctors know right away.**

Is a high KDPI kidney right for me?

High KDPI kidneys may be a good option for people who:

- Are age 50 or older
- Do not do well on dialysis or want to get off dialysis
- Want to shorten their time on the waitlist
- Have other health problems that may make it harder to get a transplant in the future

- ☐ What happens if I turn down a high KDPI kidney?
