Host a Kidney Health Screening!

What is a KEEP Healthy Screening?

KEEP Healthy screenings take place throughout the country, often in areas with minority populations who are at higher risk, and in low-income areas where people have limited access to or participation in the healthcare system.

Screenings investigate a participant's potential risk factors for chronic kidney disease, with the aim of helping them take preventative measures towards their health. It takes a participant approximately 15 minutes to complete the following stations:

- Registration
- Health Survey
- Body Mass Index (Height/Weight)
- Blood Pressure
- Urine Test
- Clinician Consultation
- Evaluation
- Resources

Where Can Screenings Be hosted?

Screenings can be held at community events, health fairs, or in corporate settings.

Requirements for a Screening:

- NKF requires participation of 50-100 people per screening in order to make the best use of resources and volunteers.
- Screening time is 3-4 hours per event.
- Participants must be age 18 and over.
- Partner to provide 10 6' tables, 30 chairs, access to restrooms and venue space.

What is the Cost of A Screening?

Screenings are provided to participants **for free**. Corporations and other interested entities can inquire about sponsorship and hosting opportunities.

681,000 people **HAVE CKD AND DON'T KNOW IT** (90% of those who have kidney damage)

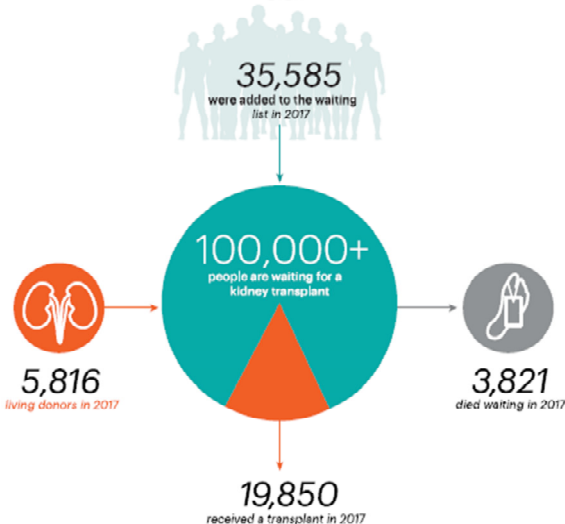

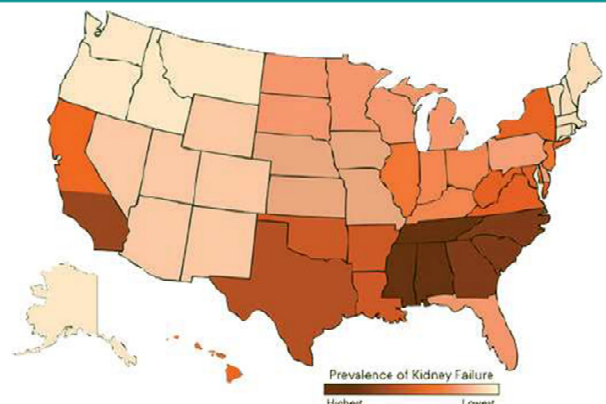
